The Project

Optional: Play instructional video to allow you to assist students as they follow along; pausing video as needed

- 1. Give each student a piece of cardstock and a sharpie
- 2. Have students write their name using pencil on the cardstock; flip over
- 3. Draw a line or multiple lines in the style of Martin all around the sheet of cardstock
- 4. Fold paper into a zine (see illustrated instructions on next page or follow instructions below); use closed sharpie to create sharp crease with each fold, lines should be facing out
- a. Fold cardstock in half "hamburger style"; unfold
- b. Fold cardstock in half "hot dog style"
- c. Fold long ends together; fold over again
- d. Open to full sheet of cardstock; you should see 8 rectangles in the folds
- e. Fold in half "hamburger style"
- f. Cut halfway along center fold line (younger students may need assistance with this step); unfold
- g. Fold in half "hot dog style"; stand paper up with cut edge at the top; push ends together to make the center fold out into a star shape
- h. Fold over to make a book
- 5. Once folded into a zine, ask students to designate the "back" page and write their name; they may also write "back" if they wish
- a. Note: The "back" page of the zine will be glued to mounting paper
- 6. Add additional images, words, doodles, and details, such as dotted lines, faces, people, flowers, and trees to complete your artwork; draw what inspires you!
- 7. Encourage students to sign their artwork, if they wish


Optional: if students finish early, they may make additional zines with the extra paper on the cart; please do not provide additional cardstock unless a student needs to restart their project that is to be mounted.

Clean up & Display

• Glue the back of the zine to mounting paper; label and display
